New York singer and guitarist Russell "Hitman" Alexander had a long tour in June, bringing over his own band including his "New York Horns". His eighteen gigs took him through to the end of July.

Wisconsin's blues-rocker John Jared Nichols arrived in Britain to tour on 21st June and played ten dates, including some as opening act for rock bands UFO and Blue Oyster Cult. Kenny Wayne Shepherd played two shows in Britain in July, and returns in late October for a further three. Kenny co-head-lined July's London Blues Festival with Goy't Mule.

Mali's Vieux Farka Touré, 50metimes dubbed "the Hendrix of The Sahara" played eight shows across Britain in June to promote his new album "Samba" for Six Degrees Records.

Chicago born Ronnie Baker Brooks, son of the late Lonnie Brooks, played a London show with his own band as part of his three date European tour to coincide with the release of his album "Times Have Changed". He appeared at Nell's Jazz & Blues Club on Thursday 6th July, his first gig in the country as a headliner, although he had appeared here before as part of his father's band.

Later in the same month, Ronnie's brother Wayne Baker Brooks also played a one-off London show, at the Fiddler's Elbow in Camden, north London on 19th July.

Blues and soul singer Bruce
"Mississippi" Johnson (yes,
he was born in Starkville, Mississippi) has now relocated to
London after working in mainland
Europe, especially France. He
had a couple of shows in north
London during May and a show
at London's Blues Cafe at the end
of July. Hopefully he will become
more active on the national
scene. Bruce has a very fine new
album of contemporary blues and
southern styled soul entitled 'The
Deal Baby' out on his own label.

July also brought **Taj Mahal and Keb' Mo'** (together) to Britain,
whilst the more regular visitors **The Billy Walton Band** and **Deb- bie Bond** also returned. **Z.Z. Top**were also in town.

Oakland's new star Fantastic
Negrito was highly acclaimed for
his shows at the end of July, and
was intervieweed in several major
newspapers – it was strange but
very welcome to see that he mentioned such names as Skip James
and Charley Patton.

August visitors included Lucky
Peterson, Eric Bibb, Rev.
Peyton's Big Damn Band
and German bluesman Henrik
Freischlader, who appeared with
the UKs Matt Schofield. Seasick Steve had a one-off appearance in Glasgow in Scotland. The

Filisko and Eric Noden also had
several low-ket shows.

RIP Paul Oliver

It is sad to report the death on 15th August of pioneering and world renowned blues researcher Paul Oliver. Paul was born in Nottingham, England on 25th May 1927, making him 90 when he died in Oxfordshire. He published his first article in 1951 (for the magazine "Jazz Journal") and he went on to write many books most blues lovers regards as essential, among them "The Story of The Blues", "Blues Fell This Morning", and "Blues Off The Record". He undertook several field trips, and some of his interview material was included in the book "Conversation With The Blues". His writing was always of a very high standard, and his research is invaluable.

NEW RELEASES

The Jive Aces, one of the UK's top jump and jive bands, mark twenty years of the same line-up with the release of the excellent album "Diggin' The Roots Vol.

Veteran guitarist Robin Trower (photo left by Laurence Harvey) released his new album "Time And Emotion" (Manhaton HATMAN 2047) on 4th August. It is a fine set of bluesy, often Hendrix-inflected rock, played with taste and subtlety. (www,manhatonrecords.com). He will play just one show in Britain this year, at the Islington Assembly Hall on 29th November. (www.Trowerpower.com)

Singer Mollie Marriott is the daughter of Steve Marriott of 60s and 70s UK outfits The Small Faces and Humble Pie, but she is most definitely pursuing her own path. She releases her debut album "Truth Is A

Wolf" (Amadeus Music) at the beginning of November. It is a fine mix of bluesy, soulful rock. (www.molliemarriott.com)

King King will release their fourth studio album "Exile & Grace" on 6th October, in conjunction with their longest ever UK tour. Alan Nimmo says that "the album has a rockier feel and sound to it. We are following our classic rock influences, Bad Company, Whitesnake, and Thunder". The band released a fine track, (She Don't) Gimme No Lovin" as a single on Manhaton Records in the end of June, showing just what they mean.

OTHER

British blues researcher **Richard Noblett** died on 29th April this year, at the age of 70. He was best known for his research into the vintage piano blues he wrote for "Blues Unlimited" magazine and several other publications and record labels, as well as writing on many other forms of roots musics.

Rolling Stone Ronnie Wood revealed in early August that he had had surgery for lung cancer, prior to the band's latest tour. He revealed he did not have chemotherapy as he did not want to lose his hair!

Alan Nimmo of King King announced in early August that the band will be taking a three month break after he suffered another setback with his vocals, with him having to stop a show in late July. The proposed October tour to coincide with the release of the new album has now been put back until January 2018, to allow him to make a fully recovery. He sends his apologies to all his fans.
